


Solitary Bees Mason Bees Genus: Osmia





(pronounced OZ-me-a)



Some mason bees are pollinators of almonds, apples, blueberries, raspberries and cherries, as well as many wild plants. They are called

mason bees because they use mud or clay to build their nests, just like a mason. A mason is someone who uses bricks and mortar to build homes and other buildings. They are small to medium-sized bees that are colored in bright metallic blues and greens and sometimes black. In Oregon, they are most often used to pollinate cherries. They work quickly: under some conditions one female mason bee can pollinate three times as many flowers as a single honey bee in the same amount of time.
