The Food Hero *Grow This!* Oregon Garden Challenge

Homes, schools and communities have come together in 2020 and 2021 to grow and build gardens, share gardening knowledge and skills and GROW Oregon's health and food supply. Challenge materials are in English and Spanish.



Our Food Hero Garden Challenge:

builds gardening skills, inspiration and self-efficacy through partnerships with the BI-MART chain of retailers, Oregon State University Master Gardeners, the Oregon Potato and Dairy and Nutrition Commissions, and hundreds of community organizations through which policy, systems and environmental (PSE) change activities occur.

provides easy to understand garden tips with common terms familiar even to new gardeners. Practical tips for stretching food dollars and increasing food security are included.

celebrates diversity, aiming to make *Grow This!* relevant and adaptable by all audiences. Components are informed by diverse work groups, by youth, adults, including older adults, and by continual connections with Oregonians from urban, rural and tribal communities. *Grow This!* in 2022 will focus on diversity.

increases access and use of fruits and vegetables in households and community sites.

Second Annual Garden Challenge FFY 2021 Oregon Grows! Together Again—By the Numbers (preliminary data)

Oregon individuals/households and group leaders represented

in the first 12 days of sign-ups, covering all 36 counties. Throughout the year, sign-ups remain open to anyone from anywhere who wants to grow along with us! In 2021, 13% of sign-ups were from people who had also participated in 2020, the first year of *Grow This!*



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Master Gardeners representing 28 of 36 Oregon counties signed up as *Grow This!* champions.

groups in 30 of 36 Oregon counties participated; 64% were from a school



(preK to 12th grade). Top reason they reported for wanting to join the challenge was to give students a chance to experience gardening and grow their own food.



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seed envelopes distributed, each containing four types of plants (spring/fall crop, summer crop, herb/edible flowers, flowers). This is an increase from 3,300 in 2020.



Oregon schools had a student/s who participated (preK to 12th grade). This is an increase from 759 in 2020.

Impacts on 2020 Challengers

A 2020 *Grow This!* post survey (*n*=812; 29% response rate) indicated that:

- 76% planted seeds as part of the *Grow This!* challenge, and 63% tasted what they harvested.
- 52% reported a significant increase in their confidence in using their garden harvest in a meal.
- 28% recalled seeing Food Hero ads or messages. One goal of the *Grow This!* challenge is to use a dual-messaging platform including Food Hero and *Grow This!* to increase overall exposure to fruit and vegetable messaging.
- 70% were very or extremely likely to recommend the *Grow This!* challenge to a friend, family member or group.

Individual/household 2021 challenger characteristics (*n*=5,717)

- 71% reported that they garden some years but not every year, or garden every year with some success; 13% described themselves as brand-new gardeners.
- 87% said they were planning to grow their seeds outdoors (in raised beds, containers or in the ground); and 12% indoors.
